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



Jeevan - Women Led Empowering Action

Jeeven women led empowering actions is an intervention design for generating sustainable grassroot level moments initiated and sustained by communities for addressing their issues. The intervention therefore is an empowering process of communities coming to the center stage of development and local governance process. One important shift which is visible this intervention is the departure from the status and roll of NGO as an implementor and becoming a facilitator of the importance process in which communities, particularly the marginalized and the voiceless, becoming owner of process rather than mere participants.

Jeeven women led empowering action is the 3rd phase of Jeeven project which is implemented by Jeevan Vikas Sanstha Amravati. Program mostly works on the 2 components of good governance and sustainable agricultures in the tribal community of Melghat Region. There are 15 villages of 2 blocks within Achalpur and Chikhaldara of Amravati district with 10070 population of tribal communities.

IMPACT STORY - 01

Meena, a lady who changed the circumstances for her people.

Meena Savalkar, age 40 stays in Kalvit village with her son, Vishal, age 21. Kalvit is a small village of 143 households of Achalpur cluster in Amravati district of Maharashtra state in India, 97% of the total population of the Korku community is found in this village. The community is dependent on the daily wages, rain fed farming and livestock. The tribal community of this village had no local government ration shop. They had to go to another village named, Buradghat to get the ration which is 4 km away. And due to the lack of proper transportation on this road villagers had been traveling by walking to reach the ration shop. Sometimes they could not get ration due to reaching late after the ration shop closed. And sometimes they were not receiving ration due to the lack of information whether the ration stock of the month is being distributed or not. The situation was worse in the rainy season when villagers were traveling into muddy roads with heavy luggage of ration on their heads. There were many reasons behind the inconvenience in getting ration to the villagers. This was a part of their lifestyle to suffer with these circumstances till March 2022.



"The first movement took place in the month of June 2022 when I did not receive my ration due to my sickness as I could not visit the shop for ration." Meena opened the first spark of the story. And then continued, "After recovering from my sickness when I visited the shop for ration, the shopkeeper rebuked me by saying, ration is finished and date of the month also is over for distribution." "After meaningless arguments with the shopkeeper, I came back home and at the same time I have decided to fight for my rights and my people." Meena shared about the first protest.

In the month of July 2022, I found hope when I heard that the government gives priority to self-help groups for running the ration shop. I decided to motivate the SHG of my village to initiate this opportunity. It was difficult to get support of SHG but Mrs. Parvati Akhande mobilized the women of the SHG and conducted their meeting. In the SHG meeting I shared about this opportunity and one more woman, Mrs. Sunanda Jamunkar supported me to get their cooperation. Finally, a SHG named 'Pragati Mahila Samuh' initiated to get ration shop.

In August 2022 we reached the Ration Department and submitted our application to get the ration shop. We successfully submitted an application with the proper documents to the panchayat level ration department. For the next two months we regularly visited the office for follow up. But we did not receive any kind of positive response from the department. In the month of November 2022, we received notice from the ration department and asked us to visit the collector office for some clarification. We visited the collector office with all the women from Pragati Mahila Samuh and met with the collector.

After one month from the meeting with the collector, we received another notice from the ration department. So, we visited the ration department and paid fees and received a Sanction letter. "It was a really great day for all the women of Pragati Mahila Samuh that we won the battle for our people." Said Meena with a smile.

After a month from there we received our first ration allocation for the distribution in our village. And on 13th of March 2023, we inaugurated our own ration shop in Kalvit and started distribution. "I still remember and will never forget the satisfied and smiley faces of our people while taking their ration in their own village and from their own people." Meena concluded.



IMPACT STORY - 02

She raised her voice in the first women's gram sabha.

"We know about common gram sabha and our men participate but we did not know about provision for women in gram sabha in Panchayat Raj Institution." Said Meera in the women gram sabha demonstration conducted by the Jeevan team in Nimdhari village. Meera is a community resource person and working for the self-help group in Nimdhari village. She supports the Jeevan team for community mobilization in this village. There are 5 self-help groups from three villages whom she supports for utilization. "Our men participate and therefore we did not participate even once in the gram sabha. They do not share the information of the gram sabha with us." Meera told. On 12/09/2022 Jeevan team gave Information on the importance of the gram sabha and the schemes for the village development. Had two-way communication in which women were motivated to identify their village level issues and take initiatives to solve with the support of women gram sabha. "I was struggling to develop each group by depending on the schemes which used to come from outside, but could not identify the schemes in the gram panchayat." Meera explained with a gloomy face.



Women of the Nimdhari village were inspired through the gram sabha demonstration and decided to submit an application to organize women gram sabha in the village. For identifying village issues and application preparation conducted another meeting with women on 17/09/2022. In this meeting discussed the issues, its solutions and at the same time women wrote applications to organise women gram sabha with



the guidance of Jeevan team. Same day, by evening women visited the gram panchayat with this application and submitted it to Mrs. Alkatai Savalkar, sarpanch of Nimdhari village's gram panchayat. "I will discuss with the PRI members and finalise the dates for women gram sabha and will soon inform to you." Mrs. Alkatai Savalkar assured.

As per the assurance Mrs. Alkatai Savalkar announced the dates of women gram sabha and informed the women group of the village. On 02/10/2022 first time and first women gram sabha was conducted in the gram panchayat of Nimdhari village. For this gram sabha 65 women participated actively and shared their village level issues. In this gram sabha women shared their issues one by one and discussed the solutions. "We have no work in the village, we heard that we can get work by the gram panchayat in the village itself. Give us Job cards and avail the work through MGNREGA." Mrs. Mankarna Mavaskar demanded on behalf of the women group. Another issue discussed by Mrs. Ganga Kale on behalf of women groups. She informed that "The condition of the road side drainage system is worst and reasonable for spreading an unhealthy atmosphere, gram panchayat should repair it." Mrs. Meera took initiative and demanded for the road repair and construction of a community hall for the gathering and meetings in the village. In the gram sabha women submitted their application on various issues and demands for the village.

"It is really a wonderful day for the women of our Nimdhari village that we raised our voice and demands for our rights in the first women's gram sabha." Mrs. Meera expresses her happiness with a smile.

SABAL

An Integrated Livelihood, Nutrition and Food Security Program for the Korku tribe

The SABAL project was launched in the Churni cluster of Melghat region 6 years back. It is being funded by Caritas Germany and guided by Caritas India. The project is designed for Korku tribal community. Korku, the lesser known as primitive tribe are found primarily in this part of Central India along with neighboring Melghat Region in Maharashtra. The present Sabal Extension is part of the same project which is being implemented in 37 villages of Melghat area.

Korku communities of 37 villages spread in Chikhaldara block of Amravati district and Washim block of Washim district of the Maharashtra are the target group of the program. The program focus will be addressing the chronic hunger and malnutrition prevailing Korku communities, particularly among Korku children, Korku women, adolescent girls and Korku farmers.

IMPACT STORY

Har Ghar Nal aur Har Ghar Jal

Background: 80 families live in Nawalgaon. The total population is 450 people. All the families work in agriculture and farming. There were two sources of water in this village. In which one was a hand pump and the other was a well. Both the well and the tap are also half a kilometer away from Nawalgaon. 80 families depended on both these sources. Very often the well and the hand pump used to get very crowded. In such a situation, girls used to miss school, women could not do their work on time, many times there were fights for getting water earlier. Some people used to go out of the water at night, so there was always a fear of wild animals. Villagers were struggling with this problem every day.

Sabal's Intervention: In Nawalgaon, Sabal worker Ganesh Jamunkar understood the problems of the village. Through the meeting, all the villagers were made aware of their rights. And told about Gram Sabha. Asked to apply in the Gram Sabha. How to prepare the application and give it a simple guide about how to follow up. And told about Har Ghar Nal Yojana.





Result achieved: An application was prepared and the Signatures of all the villagers were taken. And on May 1, 2022, the application was given in the Gram Sabha through the cbo leader. After 3 months, in the month of August, every household tap was provided under this scheme by tap connections installed in all the houses. Due to this the people of the village are very happy. Time is being saved by getting taps at home, children are also able to go to school on time, women are doing their work in time, there are no fights in the village right now, people say. And due to the guidance of sabal, this work has been made possible.



SAMARTH II

Building Resilience for Women Headed Distressed Rural Households in Maharashtra

The Samarth project launched in March 2021, during same time the second wave of the corona-19 Pandemic began to spread. The phases of lookdown were carried out in Maharashtra to control the spread of pandemic. The series of lookdown led to the poverty of Communities and hunger. Second wave of epidemic left a horrible tail many of peoples falling illness, many of them lost their lives and many of peoples lost their works so the poverty and hunger began. All economic sectors were affected and poor communities suffered severely affected. The second wave of the Corona pandemic lasted four month which began in march-2021 and ended in July- 2021. In August 2021 when the second wave of the pandemic had become less intensive and the government gradually reduced the restrictions. Samarth started to implement the main activities in the communities for enabling and capacitating the farmer's widows, vulnerable women, women headed families and distressed women. Team of Samarth not only works for the economic wellbeing of widows. But also help them to achieve more respectable social standing and acceptance in the communities. Therefore, Samarth used befriending and strategy building the confidence of vulnerable women and strengthening. Women from farmer's suicide victims' families are formed into groups so that they released their burdens of networking and Communications. Government has several programs both livelihood and welfare oriented; they are sensitized to government schemes and

SAVE A FAMILY PLAN

Save A Family Plan (SAFP) is an international non-governmental organization that is committed to seeking justice to the poor in India. It works in partnership with Jeevan Vikas Sanstha more than ten years. The program is implemented around 30 villages in the Diocese of Amravati. It provides financial assistance and services to those who are suffering from Cancer, Leprosy, HIV, Tuberculosis, physically challenged, destitute and widows through the Family Development Program. It is the charity core program, aiming to help families meet basic needs, as wells promoting self-reliance and sustainability. Therefore, at first, we identify the families who need a helping hand. With the right support, the selected families are able to build a sustainable income for themselves. It includes development sectors like economic growth through small business initiatives and savings, food security, education, health and hygiene, gender equality, environment, governance, and women empowerment. In partnership with Jeevan Vikas Sanstha, the SAFP has impoverished around 1003 families with monthly financial support and to help them to achieve their goals. 100% of all donations is received by the poor. These families have graduated of its 6-year Family Development program and have been doing well with stable source of income. Because of this support the families have received training in marketing and entrepreneurship to give them the tools needed to start their own small business. Families also receive assistance from program staff in applying for government programs and benefits enabling families to collectively access through local governments to help with issues including agricultural assistance, medical insurance, education and housing. At present we have 223 families who have been receiving support from this project. The field coordinator conducts training on Entrepreneurship Development Program where they gain knowledge and ideas about starting the small business initiatives by themselves. Other training at cluster level too

have been conducted throughout the year on topics like, Health awareness, Health practices, Organic kitchen garden, education, human rights, Awareness program, Hygiene, Awareness in implication of bad habits, Awareness on social welfare schemes, Gender impact assessment etc.

We to celebrate women's day, girl child etc. Save a Family Plan India too pays constant visit to the partner family and monitors their small business activities that have been undertaken by the beneficiaries. We too keep in touch with the donors by writing letters and Christmas cards explaining about the development and well being of the families. The field coordinator visits constantly the partner families and motivates and guides them in the process of development. The Director too visits the families personally and give them valuable guidance to run the business effectively. By doing this we come to know the family very closely. It helps us to identify the other areas where we have to focus and help the families to come up in life. Each year the partner families take up different small business activities. In some cases, they continue with the same. The family plans for the small business activities at the beginning of the year with the help of the field coordinator. Thus, they are prepared in advance to take up the various tasks with the financial assistance that they receive in the coming year. Three families have received housing scheme from the donors and have completed their construction. It gives joy to see that the families are able to start business of their own. With the cooperation of the family, we are able to implement this project successfully.

Holistic Development of Farmers, Women, Youth and Children in The Tribal Belt of Churni

Sponsored by MANOS UNIDAS

The people in several tribal villages of Churni in Melghat are extremely vulnerable to poverty, illiteracy, malnutrition, superstitions etc. They have no knowledge and means to better their cultivation and to improve the income generation due to which they are left to their own destiny since centuries. Since these villages are situated in the far-flung regions of Melghat of Maharashtra but bordering Madya Pradesh State, these tribal become victims of neglect and apathy both by NGOs and by Government. In this situation the proposed project envisages holistic development and a radical transformation in the social economic, physiological and educational lives of the people in 10 villages. This will be achieved through various interventions like sustainable and organic agricultural practices, skill training, women empowerment programmes, various training programs for youth farmers and women, support for basic education for the children etc.

The project is being funded by Manos Unidas, Spain. The project activities began in January 2023 in all the 10 villages. These villages are in Churni cluster of Melghat region.

Sustainable Safe & Clean Water - SPED-VII

Sponsored by SAFP

Objectives of Project Implementation:

In the year 2021, 4 people died due to use of contaminated water in Koylari and Pachdongry villages of Melghat area. And that contaminated water disease spread to 2500 people of the villages. Therefore, the people of both the villages were admitted to the government hospital. The water problem in these villages was very acute. In this background, Father Jose Kunnappally, Executive Director of Jeevan Vikas Sanstha, wrote a project. The reason for writing the project was that the people of these villages could get clean and good drinking water. For this, it was decided to provide water purifiers to the people. And it was decided to provide water purifiers to 500 families of the village through the organization "Save a Family Plan India".

Outcome:

If we consider the villages of this tribal area today, the current situation is that even drinking water is not available in these villages. The women of the village have to fetch water from a distance of two kilometers outside the village for drinking. In such a situation, the family members are drinking good water after cleaning the contaminated water. This causes diseases by drinking contaminated water. It has subsided. Because the person of this family is getting clean water to drink. Today the people of the village are bringing water from the well to drink. With the help of the water purifier, water is purified and people now can use it for drinking. That's why the outbreak of the disease has reduced in these families. And mostly 500 families are using this water purifier. On asking in some families, it was found that due to water purifiers the rate of malnutrition is also decreasing. The weight of malnourished children is increasing rapidly. And slowly these children are coming out of malnutrition.





Project Implementation Process:

Initially the survey was done in Pachdongri and Koylari villages. In the survey, priority was given to the head of the family coming under BPL in the project. But after the survey it was found that there are very few BPL families in these two villages. Hence 10 more villages surrounding this area were included in the project. Ten villages namely Kaneri, Koylari, Pachdongri, Gangarkheda, Toranwadi, Dahendri Dhana, Dahendri Palshya, Churni Dhana, Korda, Awagad were included in the project. That is, the work of the project started in total 13 villages. While water purifiers were distributed to 500 BPL families in 13 villages.

Training workshop:

Awareness was created in 13 villages through training. And the persons who were eligible for water purifier were selected. Such women and men were trained. They were told about the importance use of clean water. The importance of water purifier was explained. Information on the use of water purifiers was given.

Jeevan Vikas Sanstha in collaboration with Davasagar and Matruchava had organized district level consultation on traditional healers under the SABAL program at Jeevan Vikas Sanstha, Amravati Maharashtra, The Dignitaries of the program were Dr. Kailash Ghodake, deputy CEO, ICDS, Amravati, Dr. Dilip Ranmale, District Health Officer, Amravati, Dr. Subhash Dhole, Additional district health officer, medical officers and superintendents who enriched and enlightened the traditional healers. Rev. Fr. Dr. Jolly and Dr. Saju M.K. addressed the assembly of the traditional healers and encouraged and motivated them for the jointly venture of the noble task. District Administrator held discussion with more than 100 traditional healers, Asha, Anganwadi workers who have given assurance to work jointly with ICDS, Health and Nutrition Department.

AGRICULTURE FESTIVALS 2023

The District Agriculture Festival was held from 1st to 5th March 2023 at Science Core, Amravati. The event was jointly organized by the Department of Agriculture, ATMA, Mavim Amravati and Caritas India New Delhi (Jeevan Vikas Sanstha, Dayasagar Social Centre, Matrichaya). The programme was presided over by Mr. Dr. Anil Bonde (Member of Parliament, Rajya Sabha), Padma Shri Dr. Ravindra Kolhe (Senior Social Worker), Prominent Honorable M.S. Navneet Rana (Lok Sabha MP, Amravati), Ma, Ravi Rana (Mla Badnera) Pawanit Kaur (District Magistrate, Amravati) Dr. Saju Sir (Zonal Manager, Caritas India) was also present on the occasion. Under the technical guidance of Karitas India, 15 stalls of Jeevan Vikas Sanstha, Amravati, Dayasagar Social Center Ranigram Dharani, and Matrichaya Social Welfare Society Bhandaraj, Anjangaon were set up. A total of 7 stalls of food items were prepared from the sale of food grains, kutki rice and urad bhaji, sava pulao, kutki kheer, maize bhakar, chana usal, red rice, red chilli powder, moh flowers. In this way, 5 stalls were set up for food. There was 1 stall of forest produce and 1 stall of oil crops in which there were oil seeds (til, survaful, bhuimung shega, jagni) etc. People responded well and a large number of people bought from the stoll. In this, the four stalls of Jeevan Vikas Sansthan earned a net profit of Rs 11,344 per share. All Amravati kars appreciated the grain stol. OUR DIOCESAN PARTNERS AND COLLABORATORS IN SOCIAL SECTOR

MANAV SHAKTI SANSTHA, PANDHARKAWADA

Manay Shakti Santha is the brainchild of His Grace Most Rev. Elias Gonsalves the Archbishop of Nagpur and the Apostolic Administrator of Amravati and his vision was the upliftment of the backward Kolam tribes. Kolam tribal community who inhabit Pandharkawada Taluka (Yavatmal District) and the surrounding areas are still deprived of basic health and education facilities and hence Manay Shakti Santha strives to fulfill this goal under the leadership of Fr Cornelius Kujur the Director of the Institute. This Year the Centre focused on health enhancement and organised many awareness programs in Pandharkawada and the surrounding areas. We followed a systematic methodology of including a Doctor, Nurse. Asha Worker and Anganwadi worker for the Programs. The Methodology is demonstrated through a brief description of the Health Awareness Program that was held on 26th September 2022, at Anganwadi, Mangurla Khurd, Zari Jamni, Yavatmal. The chief guest for the programme was Dr Chandu Kudmethe from Government Hospital, Zari. The other dignitaries present for the program were Mrs Sangita Ade, Fr Cornelius Kujur, Fr Surjeet Tirkey and Mrs Mangla Soyam. The dignitaries were welcomed with flower bouquets. The program began with lighting the lamp followed by a prayer song. Fr Cornelius Kujur stressed the need to sleep inside the mosquito nets at night and to drink boiled water to prevent diseases like Typhoid, Malaria, Dengue etc. He also said that people need to keep themselves free from all kinds of narcotics products like; tobacco, kharra, cigarettes and so on. Mrs Sangita Ade dealt with the topic 'immunization and its importance'. Being a nurse herself, she shared the field experience on immunization in the village and those factors which act as an impediment to the work of immunization. Based on her findings, she tried to clarify the doubts and misbeliefs of the villagers; mothers of infants under immunization were asked to take initiative and to avail the immunization programme which occurs at least once in every month at PHCs. She also spelled out the important role of ASHA and village leaders for mobilizing the mothers and children. Therefore, she seriously stressed the crucial role of ASHA to link up the ANM in order to fix the date and arrange for the immunization. This program was aimed at making the role of ASHA clear to the general public so that the ASHA's programme and works can be carried out properly. The people present interacted with the resource person to know the duty of ASHA on health service at grass root level. Dr. Chandu Kudmethe took a session on Viral Hepatitis; he said that Viral Hepatitis is rapidly spreading this year among the villages. He mainly stressed on remedial measures since the viral Hepatitis can be prevented. Hence, he highlighted the methods on how to prevent viral Hepatitis at village level. Cleanliness, proper food patterns and hygiene was the three point agenda spelled out as a preventive measure. Besides preventive measures, Dr. Chandu Kudmethe differentiated the viral Hepatitis from other diseases by giving detailed description of the signs and symptoms. He appealed to the villagers to avoid mishandling viral Hepatitis with self medication without proper medical description given by doctors. Mrs. Mangla Soyam, ASHA worker of the village closed the one day Health Awareness Program by proposing the vote of thanks. She challenged the villagers present to practice and spread the message of the program throughout the village.



MATRUSCHAYA HOSPITAL, BHANDARAJ

Bhandaraj is a remote village situated in the District of Amravati. The Government Health Infrastructure in Bhandaraj Village and also in the surrounding villages is very poor and Matruchaya Hospital run by the Holy Cross Sisters is the only place of refuge and solace for the poor of Bhandaraj and its surrounding hamlets. The Hospital under the leadership of Sr Joycy Koreath SCC is rendering veoman service to the poor patients who can't afford the posh Hospitals in the City. The Hospital has 3 Doctors and 5 Nurses who are dedicated in their mission. The Hospital has performed cataract surgeries of 55 poor patients for a neater sum of just Rs 7000 per patient. This is possible because on from 11" February 2022 the hospital welcomed all eye infected patients not only for treatment which was going on since 2006 but also for ophthalmic services of all kinds including operation. Almost a year and more we worked hard with our team of staff to get the Operation Theatre (OT) established. The extremely poor patients were operated free of cost. In addition to the ocular facilities the hospital is also giving ECG facilities to the poor patients at an extremely meagre sum of Rs 150 and we are proud to say that 96 poor patients have benefitted from this facility. 19 village girls are getting trained as nursing assistants. They go with a certificate after a year's training to fetch jobs in different hospitals, and are able to earn a salary of Rs. 7000/8000 p.m. Ayurveda medicines are prepared in the hospital for diabetic, general health improvements, aches & pains, etc and this process is facilitated through a massage centre The Herbal Garden is another topic to be spoken about. Varieties of herbal plants are grown in the garden for medical purposes. Aloe Vera plants are the recent addition to this flora rich garden and the Hospital staff have extracted 100 liters of Aloe Vera juice from the garden and then distributed it to the poor patients of Bhandaraj and also the surrounding villages. The Hospital also runs a Mobile Clinic which is very regular in reaching out to the poor and the needy patients and we are proud of the fact that we have been able to reach out to more than 700 patients. In this way we try to radiate the healing power of Jesus who is our Divine Healer.

LEPROSY AND HIV RELIEF AND REHABILITATION CENTRE, NIMBHORA

The Diocese of Amravati was established a Leprosy Relief and Rehabilitation Centre at Nimbhora; a place located 6 km. away from Amravati town and 4 km. from Badnera Railway Station in Vidarbha, Maharashtra, India. In 1980 on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee year of the Diocese the Centre was blessed by Rt. Rev. Dr. Joseph Rosario, MSFS and placed under the directorship of the sympathetic and kindhearted veteran Missionary Rev. Fr. M.T. Thomas, MSFS. Since then it has catered to the needs of countless victims of leprosy and AIDS. Currently this Centre is functioning under the inspiring leadership of Rev.Fr Matthew Theruvath and he is assisted by the Religious Sisters belonging to the Congregation of Assisi Sisters of Mary Immaculate. We have 14 Leprosy patients this year and we have made all round efforts for their welfare and well being. Regular dressing and medicines are provided to them. We also provide them nutritious food as prescribed by the Doctor. In addition to this there are special exercise and yoga sessions which

are organised for the patients. All these sessions are animated by a trained Physiotherapist. We have three HIV + children under our care. Two children go to a local school while the other inmate goes to a local college after having achieved humongous success in the HSC exams. We also organized cultural activities during Christmas, Diwali, Independence Day, Republic Day etc. All our inmates wholeheartedly participated in these activities and showcased their talents. We also organise various spiritual activities for the inmates. The Daily Morning Eucharist, Gospel Reflection and Evening Rosary help our inmates to experience divine healing presence of the Lord. We also organise counseling sessions for the inmates and this process is done in a very professional way. This process enables a self healing process as the inmates are able to open up and share their pain and loneliness. Thus our centre continues to be an abode of Christ's love and mercy.

JIVAN JYOTI ADIVASI KENDRA, DUNI

Jeevan Jyothi Adivasi Kendra which is run by Duni Mission is dedicated to the service of Korku Tribals. Fr Biju James is the Director of the Centre and under his ledge the centre is doing stupendous work in different fields and taking forward the Mission of Christ Educational Development and Training Programme Jeevan Jyoti Adivasi Center organized vocational guidance and teaching classes for the students of XII (Science). Altogether 15 students took advantage of this guidance camp. Technical education plays an integral role in the development of a country. Technicians are needed in every field of construction. Keeping this fact in mind, Jeevan Jyoti Adivasi Kendra organized a Technical guidance, under which 7 students were taught motor rewinding and mobile repairing. Fr Biju James also completed the renovation of the Hostel and thus has facilitated the comfortable stay of the Tribal children Agricultural and Environmental Development On January 29, 2022,, 50 farmers from 5 villages (Kadhav, Chak, Hatnada, Kekdabode and Baspani) were taken for organic farming orientation, Avurvedic medicine orientation and lift irrigation training in Mansudhavadi village. Under the guidance of Sanjay Jawanjal, farmers obtained full guidance on business related to organic farming and related farming practice in the month of September, the Center organized a meeting of all the farmers, in which a detailed discussion took place on agriculture development and government schemes. Under the leadership of the Center, the process of cleaning and renovation of the fish pond of the mission has been completed. This will give momentum in making the mission self-sufficient through fishery development. Through the process of renovation, favorable conditions for fisheries will be created and the food requirements of the mission will also be fulfilled. Woman and Child Development Training and sports competition of 50 children from 5 villages was completed on 25 January 2022. First the cultural program was organized. After the

cultural programme, educational sessions were organized on topics like child rights, protection of environment etc. After this various sports competitions were organized and at the end all the winners were felicitated by the hands of Sister Flower Maria. We selected widows and poor women from 10 villages and helped them set up saree shop, grocery shop, sewing centre and goat rearing centre. Free cloth distribution campaign was completed for the children of Anganwadi in the month of September, as well as the health check-up of these children was also completed.

ASHADEEP VIKAS KENDRA, MALKAPUR

Ashadeep Vikas Kendra, Malkapur Ashadeep Vikas Kendra run by Roman Catholic Mission Malkapur is dedicated to the development of tribal farmers. Father Vipin Oriya is the director of this center. The farmers of Korku tribe are deprived of modern agricultural technology and this center helps the farmers to increase their production as well as avail the benefits of government schemes and their civil rights. On 7th January 2022, a training or exposure program was organized for the farmers at our center. During this programme, farmers were informed about the organic production of wheat, gram, onion and other crops through experimental guidance. Farmers learned new methods of organic agriculture production. On January 13, 2022, Malkapur Mission organized an inspirational learning session based on skill development for the youth. Mr. Rajesh, a local electrical wiring specialist from Malkapur, under the leadership of Mission Director Father Vipin Oriya, conducted this program. On May 7, 2022, a one-day workshop was organized for the farmers at Ashadeep Vikas Kendra, Malkapur under the guidance of Father Vipin Oriya. Mr. Satish Chimte was the resource person of this workshop. This workshop was organized with the aim of making the supply of seeds available at their homes. Altogether 50 farmers participated in this workshop. On Monday, October 15, a special session based on government schemes and its implementation was organized for the farmers in Kheda village. Sunil Jambekar moderated the session and challenged the farmers to take advantage of various government schemes. Altogether 25 farmers participated in the session. On 17th October, a special seminar on Natural Pesticide Management was organized for the farmers in Vastapur village. Altogether 10 farmers participated in this session. Praveen Jamkar, the director of the session, explained the bio-pesticide production process to the farmers

ST. MARY'S HEALTH CENTRE, ASADPUR

Montfort Community Welfare Centre which is situated at Kusumkot is run by Montfort Brothers of St Gabriel and is moving forward on the path of success under the dynamic leadership of Bro Jose Kalelly SG. The Centre is involved in many social activities in Kusumkot which is a remote village in Melghat Region. Kusumkot village and the neighbouring villages fall under the most deprived areas of Melghat. To improve the quality of Education in this area is a challenge and therefore in the month of September we organised a Network meeting of all the NGOs working in Melghat at our Centre. The Agenda of this meeting was 'Importance of the Right of Education Act'. The Centre also effectively conducted supplementary classes for the poor students of Kusumkot and the surrounding villages. The Supplementary classes are helmed by qualified teachers and are going on very well. We also organised Korku Mahapanchayats in Adivasi Centre, Dharni and at our Centre. The Mahapanchayats discussed various issues plaguing the Korku tribals. The lack of infrastructural facilities, illiteracy etc was discussed and deliberated in detail during the Mahapanchayat. The Mahapanchayat also deliberated on the steps to promote Korku culture. In collaboration with Manos Unidas we have also started a Project aimed at Soil Conservation since soil erosion has become a common phenomenon in Melghat Region. Aforestation, crop rotation, bund construction etc. are some of the measures envisioned by the Project. Lack of pure drinking water has also become a common characteristic of Melghat Region and we are therefore trying our level best in collaboration with government authorities. Thus in a small and yet a powerful way we are trying to spread the light of Christ in the dark corners of despair and hopelessness

It is a pastoral-socio-health centre which was started in 1988 as a sub centre of Dayasagar Hospital Amravati. It belongs to Rasegaon mission. This land at Asadpur is donated by a local landlord. The vision of the donor was to run charitable activities for the welfare of the local people. From the very beginning there was a dispensary for treating primary health problems and type writing and tailoring centers. According to the signs of the times and need of the people of the locality we added snake bite clinic and a girl's boarding for the tribal children from remote village areas and nomadic children of Paradise. Dr Sr Sophy FCC is currently the Director of the Centre. In the year 2022 we have treated 310 snake bite cases and 4800 general cases.

Dayasagar Social Centre is a leading humanitarian organization, established in the year 2014, is dedicated to work for the poor and marginalized through various programmes and projects with the aim of lasting improvements and sustainable development. Being placed in Melghat Region of Maharashtra we give more emphasis on malnutrition issue of Korku tribal population.

Objectives:

Dayasagar coordinates all the development and welfare activities of Dayasagar Hospital Trust like Community Development through empowerment sessions, Women empowerment programmes, Promotion of diversification in food production and intake, Promote protein sufficiency, access to institutional services and schemes, Encourage people to make the Local governance systems more responsive, Promotion of organic farming, Livelihood programmes, Health care, Education, Skill upgradation programmes etc. Through these varieties of programmes and projects we reach out to children, youth, women and farmers. Investing in children, youth, women and farmers show that their empowerment benefits the whole society.

HOLY CROSS DISPENSARY, MARIAMPUR

OPD Patients: O.P.D. services are available at our dispensary from 8.00 am - 6.00 p.m and whenever patients needed the treatment and care. During this year 990 patients were given treatment at the dispensary and 60 in-patients were treated. Regular house and village visits were made to follow up of the previous programs and study the progress of the activities conducted. We have the sanitary project for 5 villages to spread awareness on prevention of sickness based on hygiene and cleanliness, HIV prevention, Cancer prevention, water borne diseases, Tuberculosis awareness, Herbal medicine training program, acupressure training, Nutrition awareness program, ANC and PNC, and other health Issues. Many patients were treated for seasonable sickness and ailments and about 30 cases of severe anaemia were treated through proper diet and medication.

Mobile clinic: We organise mobile clinic in the villages 4 days in a week. We were able to treat 250 patients in different villages on various seasonable sicknesses, given them medical treatment and awareness talks on how to prevent diseases by using clean drinking water and keep surroundings clean. We have given timely care and treatment to Balgruha and school students. In emergencies and accidents we have done our best to do the needful.

Awareness Programs: We were able to conduct awareness program on prevention of various sicknesses, health and hygiene for women .Women were helped to understand norms of living and protecting the families from various water borne diseases, air borne disease, T.B, Cancer and other diseases by preventive methods. 200 beneficiaries have benefitted and have learnt to take care of their family. We used handouts and charts to give awareness talks

LITTLE FLOWER HEALTH INSTITUTE, RASEGAON

Rasegaon is an interior village and it has no access to health care. The Little Flower Health Institute run by the SMMI sisters under the guidance of the Roman Catholic Mission, Rasegaon is the only solace for the people of Rasegaon and the neighboring villages. We have 1 Doctor and 4 nurses working in this institute under the guidance of the Director Sr Bhavna SMMI. Rasegaon has always been a haven of snake breeding and the instances of snake bite are very common especially among the poor farmers and daily wage labourers. This Institute is their only refuge and therefore this year from January to October we have treated 260 patients successfully who were affected by snake bite. We also provide quality treatment to the patients who are suffering from different ailments and the fact that we have treated 2500 patients in this year stands out as the shining testimony to this fact. We also organize regular Medical Camps in Rasegaon and the neighboring villages. We organised a major medical camp in the month of March in Rasegaon where

many people got their check up done and 2 medical camps in the month of October in the surrounding interior villages. Thus we move ahead in humility radiating the love and mercy of Christ.



DAYASAGAR HOSPITAL, AMRAVATI

Having received the mandate of Jesus Christ, the Divine Healer, to ensure life in its fullness and inspired by His compassionate love; Dayasagar Hospital started in January 1987 with 4 beds. By the grace of God and generosity of many; Dayasagar Hospital flourished to be a 100 bed hospital with many facilities. We have strength of 25 doctors of different specialties, 80 nurses, 30 paramedical staff, 15 ward boys and 30 housekeeping staff. Dr Sr Rachita FCC is currently the Medical Superintendent of the Hospital.

The statistics of the Hospital from January to

- * September 2022 is as follows
- * Outpatient Department: 24,724
- * In patient Department: 3,826

In our hospital we are giving free treatment to the weaker and indigenous patients who are holding BPL cards and those who really deserve the free treatment. From January to September we have treated 346 BPL patients with free treatment worth Rs 22, 00,000

Renewal Assessment of the entry level NABH (National Accreditation Board for Hospitals) NABH is a national standardization of hospitals. Dayasagar Hospital got the entry level NABH on 3rd July 2016. It was an important milestone in the history of the Hospital. On 13th August 2022 we had the 4th Renewal Assessment for the entry level NABH. Inspection is always a time of tension and exhaustion. Dr. Siddhartha Chagaleti, the Principal Assessor of NABH had come for the inspection. Inspection went on from 8am to 8pm. Many people extended their helping hands for the success of the inspection. By God's Grace and everyone's Co- operation and Collaboration, it became a successful one. Our Hospital has received the Accreditation to NABH, to ensure greater quality, patient care and safety. Accreditation is a process in which certification of competency, authority or credibility is presented to the organization. NABH is mandatory to empanel the hospital for health insurance.

Medical Camp

In collaboration with other charitable hospitals, under the guidance of Assistant Charity commissioner, Amravati; we conducted free Medical Camp for the Prisoners of the Central Jail, Amravati on 21st August 2022. In the camp, the staff of Dayasagar Hospital examined the prisoners and also provided free medication to all the sick prisoners. It was well appreciated by the Honourable Collector of Amravati District.

Helping Hand to Adivasi Ashram School, Nandgaon

On 8th September 2022 we had a meeting with the Assistant Charity Commissioner and members of Adivasi Community; for the safety and development of the students of Adivasi Ashram School, Nandgaon. The Hospital distributed note books to all students and Aqua Water Purifier.

New Dialysis unit: Donation from Ajmere Family

Dr.Jaya and Dr.Satya Ahuja, Chicago, USA donated Rs.79,00,000/- in memory of Late Sau. Shantabai Gulabrao Ajmere for Dayasagar Hospital to start a new Dialysis Unit. The Department is getting ready with 4 units capable of working 24 hours for kidney patients who are poor and needy. We gratefully acknowledge the great contribution of Ajmere family.



DAYASAGAR HOSPITAL, KUSUMKOT

Life is the most precious gift that God has given to us. We participate in the life giving mission of God. It is with great joy we present the report of our Healing Ministry and Evangelization in Melghat Region through Dayasagar Hospital, Kusumkot. It is a Rural Hospital, which comes under Dayasagar Hospital Trust, Amravati registered under the Societies Registration Act of 1890. It is the fulfilment of the dream of our congregation to be with the unreached and marginalized people of tribal area and at the same time a paradigm shift from institutional care to village oriented care. It witnesses a Christian Presence in the midst of people of other faith and tribals of Melghat. It has been at the service of the poor and marginalized people of Melghat for the past 17 years. We are blessed with our two efficient and well experienced doctors - Sr Dr Lissy Jose (MBBS, MD) and Sr Dr Linet (MD, DGO). After long years of service in Dayasagar, Amravati and other places, they have joined Dayasagar Hospital, Kusumkot to continue the healing mission of Jesus. Their very presence and dedicated service is beneficial to many poor people. In order to give critical care to the patients a well furnished ICU was set up in the month of June. Many critical patients are well treated here.

Our Contribution in the field of TB Control at Melghat:

We give priority to the care and treatment of Tuberculosis patients. Since our hospital is sanctioned as DMC (District Microscopy Centre) and X-Ray centre, we are concentrating on early diagnosis and full course therapy to control TB. Seeing the increased number of defaulters due to poor economic background and lack of nutritious food, FCC Amala Province came forward with its financial support. And we started a programme of accommodating for two months, 24 patients per year with nutritional and medical support. We treated 21 patients in the current year.

Facilities available in TB control Programme:

- 1. DMC (B)- For early detection & full course treatment
- 2. Isolated TB ward of 6 beds
- 3. Health awareness classes
- 4. Medical camps

Positive Cases detected 45: We collaborated with the Government for the T.B detection survey in the month of September through X-Ray procedure and testing of 90 people (22 children from Ashram School, Titamba and the rest from the villages of Kalamkar, Sadravadi, Rani Tamboli, Bijudawadi, Dharni, and Duni etc. Out of them 17 were detected with Tuberculosis.)

We collaborate with Government for controlling -HIV AIDS.

Total slides tested for HIV from January to September 2022: 120

De-addiction treatment

De- addiction medicines and Family Counselling is given.

SEVA SADAN DISPENSARY, KARA

A person's most useful asset is not a head full of knowledge but a heart full of love, an ear ready to listen and a hand willing to help others. The world should be a better place by our presence. So as per this philosophy, the sisters at Kara are involved in Health Ministry. We are working with all the sections of the society, irrespective of caste, creed, religion or gender, with a special focus towards the upliftment of the poor. Sr Gracy FS is the in charge of the Seva Sadan, Kara Dispensary and she is very much dedicated to her Health Apostolate. Patients from 20 remote villages suffering from different illnesses come to our dispensary as hospitals are far from the villages. We radiate the love of Christ with our healing touch.

Besides this, we are carrying out the following activities:

- 1. Attending to the patients at our dispensary day-night
- Taking serious patients to Paratwada, Amravati and Dharni etc.
- 3 Mobile clinic in 10 villages.
- Conducting awareness programmes in 10 villages, with different topics and issues like prevention of sickness like anemia, water born diseases, sickle cells, scabies, personal and environment hygiene.
- 5. Awareness on World Tuberculosis Day and AIDS Day.
- Medical and surgical interventions for the patients of complicated sickness like Aids, cancer, gastrointestinal problem, severe anemia, sickle cells patients and other complications follow up for medical camp.

- Conducting 2 eye camps and taking the patients to Kothara hospital for the cataract operation and for minor surgeries.
- Encouraging people to have herbal medicine and garden in the surrounding areas.

We are giving health services at homes especially to those who are unable to come to the dispensary. During mobile clinics, people are treated and made aware of the seasonal diseases through awareness talks. From 1st January 2022 to 30th September 2022 we have treated nearly 6486 patients in our dispensary. Some of the complicated patients were referred to the hospitals such as Amravati, Paratwada, Harisal and Dharni and other private hospitals. Some patients were treated with a procedure of urine catheterization. The patients who come to our dispensary are treated with care, love, respect and dignity. During the summer and rainy seasons, per day around 150 to 200 patients are being treated. Since the people of this area are poor, we charge a minimum amount for the medicine. So that poorest of the poor people can afford the treatment at our dispensary. Some of the patients are given free medication especially those who cannot pay even the moderate fees. Thus no patient is sent without medication.



FRANCISCAN VIDYA NIKETAN, KHAMGAON

School social work is a specialized area of professional practice in the broad field of social work. School social workers are trained in providing comprehensive supports and services to address barriers impacting the social, emotional, academic, and physical needs of all students. School social work services include assessment and screening, individual and group counseling, crisis intervention and prevention, family support, advocacy, and classroom instruction. School social workers provide consultation and training to administrators and school personnel related to the whole child, including behavior and classroom management, mental health, child abuse. Social workers honour diversity and different ways of knowing. They build an inclusive and safe environment for students, caregivers, families and staff. In schools, social workers help students build resilience, confidence and self-efficacy. They believe that every student is an individual who has the ability to learn, grow and solve problems. Working closely with students, teachers, caregivers, families and healthcare professionals, social workers

build upon student strengths. They support students as they work toward their goals and help address barriers to education so students can reach their potential. Franciscan Vidya Niketan, Khamgaon is a social service centre engaged in social work related to educational enhancement and is guided by Rev. Fr Shantwan Kutekar MSFS. The Centre helps the poor children to march forward on the path of success by providing them with free books and stationary and also facilitating supplementary classes. The Supplementary Classes are organised in such a way that it facilitates systematic language flow along with lucid conceptual understanding. The Centre also facilitated quality housing for the poor by ensuring infrastructural and financial resources for them. The Centre faces a lot of challenges but it strives hard to fulfill the needs of the poor. The Centre is indeed indebted to the visionary leadership of Rev. Fr Shantwan Kutekar MSFS whose larger vision of Franciscan Spirituality has been the backbone of this centre.

JYOTI CENTRE FOR COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION, AKOT

Jyoti Centre for Community Organization functioning under Roman Catholic Mission, Akot has been mirroring the face of Christ in the hearts and minds of the poor for many years. Currently the organization is working under the dynamic leadership of Rev. Fr Vishal Viegas OFM cap. The Organization is catering to the education needs of 552 children in 15 villages. The neigbouring villages surrounding Akot are very backward in terms of human development index and this has resulted in poor educational development of the children. Thus these supplementary classes have become the only refuge for these poor children and we have 15 well qualified teachers at the helm of these classes. In addition to these classes we also conduct many Health

Awareness Programs. We also organize career guidance seminars for youth and Empowerment Program for women. Bullaghat, Dhakade, Ramapur, Somthana, Dharud, Sanglud, Pimpri, Jayanpur, Pimpri Kurd, Rahaspur, Akot Vastri, Popatkhed, Kelpani and Vasra are the villages covered by the Organisation.



MONFORT COMMUNITY WELFARE CENTRE, KUSUMKOT

Montfort Community Welfare Centre which is situated at Kusumkot is run by Montfort Brothers of St Gabriel and is moving forward on the path of success under the dynamic leadership of Bro Jose Kalelly SG. The Centre is involved in many social activities in Kusumkot which is a remote village in Melghat Region. Kusumkot village and the neighbouring villages fall under the most deprived areas of Melghat. To improve the quality of Education in this area is a challenge and therefore in the month of September we organised a Network meeting of all the NGOs working in Melghat at our Centre. The Agenda of this meeting was 'Importance of the Right of Education Act'. The Centre also effectively conducted supplementary classes for the poor students of Kusumkot and the surrounding villages. The Supplementary classes are helmed by qualified teachers and are going on very well. We also organised Korku Mahapanchayats in Adivasi Centre, Dharni and at our Centre. The Mahapanchayats discussed various issues plaguing the Korku tribals. The lack of infrastructural facilities, illiteracy etc was discussed and deliberated in detail during the Mahapanchayat. The Mahapanchayat also deliberated on the steps to promote Korku culture. In collaboration with Manos Unidas we have also started a Project aimed at Soil Conservation since soil erosion has become a common phenomenon in Melghat Region. Aforestation, crop rotation, bund construction etc are some of the measures envisioned by the Project. Lack of pure drinking water has also become a common characteristic of Melghat Region and we are therefore trying our level best in collaboration with government authorities. Thus in a small and yet a powerful way we are trying to spread the light of Christ in the dark corners of despair and hopelessness.

DIVYA SADAN SOCIAL CENTRE, WADALI

Divya Sadan Social Centre has focused all their attention towards building the capacities of the target communities through development interventions from June to October 2022 in Amravati District covering four blocks of Nandgaon Khandeshwar, Morshi, Chandur Bazar & Amravati.

Child Development Centres (CDC): Divya Sadan engaged 28 animators to build the capacities of 824 low income group children in both rural and tribal belt and engaged children through activity based education in all the CDCs. The children got interested through this new way of learning as each child felt important and gained confidence that they too can win. The children celebrated and participated in the season of creation through planting of trees in their villages and took part in the drawing competition on the theme 'Me and My Environment'. The concept was well explained before the competition by an environmentalist who was specially invited to speak to the children in their language.

Natural and Organic farming: More than 100 farmers were pursued with the emphasis on Organic farming in both rural and tribal areas. The farmers came forward to use the Vermin compost manure for the cultivation of their crops and the fruit trees in their vicinity. 50 farmers were given vermin compost kit

Low cost farming: Women with low income groups were motivated and encouraged to cultivate saffron and ginger in their plots. The small farmers were happy as they could cultivate their crops with less expense. 184 beneficiaries were given Saffron seeds and 196 farmers were given ginger to plant in sack and in the plots.

Kitchen Garden Training: Special training was conducted for the Women of Self Help Groups to promote kitchen garden in the target villages with special focus on the nutrition. The women were taught the bifurcation the plot as per the guidelines given by the Panchayat Samiti to have access to all types of vegetables. 200 women participated in the meeting and were given seeds packet to them.

Skill training: It is being provided for 168 youth in Tailoring, fashion designing, Computer courses in MSCIT and typing towards self-reliance. It was heartwarming to see the young married women learning the computer in the rural villages. We appreciate and thank all the benefactors and the well-wishers for their support and encouragement.

DIVYA JYOTI CENTRE FOR COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION, MARIYAMPUR

Divya Jyoti Centre for Community Organisation is constantly working in small and yet in a powerful way for the upliftment of the Korku tribals of Mariampur and the adjoining areas. The organisation is guided by Rev. Fr Shimon Chummar who is also the Manager of Roman Catholic Mission, Mariyampur. The Organisation has very limited resources and yet we try our level best to see Christ in the poor. When you have fewer resources or fewer resources at work than needed, you need to prioritize tasks. Identify the tasks that must be completed first and focus on what's important. This has been the pedagogy of Fr Shimon a maverick management guru who has given priority to housing and education in the implementation module of the Centre. The organisation has ensured

that all the poor children of Mariampur receive free textbooks, stationeries and notebooks and has thus ensured quality education for the poor pupils. The climatic condition of Mariyampur is very extreme and it naturally affects the houses of the tribals. Keeping this factor in mind Rev. Fr Shimon Chummar has facilitated the reconstruction and renovation of the dilapidated houses. The Organisation provided strong doors, windows, sand, cement, bricks, stones etc to the needy Korku people depending on the condition of the houses. The organisation is also well aware of its social commitment and hence when the repeated pleas to the local Municipality failed the organisation took up the humongous task of cleaning 3 contaminated ponds with the help of the villagers. The Ponds were clean before the monsoon and thus

the visionary leadership of Rev. Fr Shimon Chummar prevented potential epidemic alike situation and also water scarcity. A management Guru believes in diversification and hence the centre inspired by the visionary outlook of Fr Shimon Chummar has also stratified the strategic planning of the centre to include healthcare too in the outreach program. Keeping the

Omicron spread in mind Fr Shimon Chummar organized a Covid Vaccination Drive on 21* February, 2022 at St Francis de Sales Church, Chikhaldara and along with the 1st and the 2nd dose booster dose was also administered to all the eligible people in collaboration with Government Health Centre, Chikhaldara. On 30th June, 2022 approximately 40 people from Salona Mission benefited from the medical camp organised by the Centre and on 1" July, 2022 medical camp was organised at Mariampur in which almost 30 people benefited. The Centre conducted an Eye Camp on 4th July, 2022 in which 40 patients participated and all the needy patients were given spectacles in collaboration with Kottara Hospital, Paratwada. The Centre also bore the expenses of all the patients who needed eve surgery and it was successfully completed in Kottara Hospital, Parathwada. On 17th October, 2022 a special medical camp was organised for the Senior Citizens and around 33 people benefitted from the camp and nutritious food was served to the people after the camp. The work of the Centre was appreciated by Mrs Navnet Rana the MP of Amravati and also Mr Ravi Rana the MLA of Badnera who visited the Mission and was spellbound by the yeoman service rendered by the Centre. The Centre also organised a meeting of the dignitaries with the people in which they assured to solve all the infrastructural issues of Mariampur. The Centre is also committed in renewing the Coffee Garden and more than 20000 saplings were planted this year. Thus the Centre under the stewardship of Fr Shimon Chummar has improved Human Resource Development Index of Mariampur and the surrounding areas.



JAGRUTI SEVA KENDRA, WASHIM

JAGRUTI SEVA KENDRA is run by Maria Nilaya Sisters, the Congregation of the MISSIONARY SISTERS OF THE QUEEN OF THE APOSTLES. The aim of this organization is to restore the human dignity of rural communities through the process of capacity building, sustainable development and vibrant community.

Our OBJECTIVES is to promote and facilitate integrated human development, particularly, of the disadvantage and the weaker section of the society and to assist in social health service activities aimed at the total development of the poor and vulnerable communities irrespective of cast, creed, religion.

With support of Caritas India, in collaboration with Jeevan Vikas Sanstha, Jagruti Seva Kendra is co-coordinating various development activities and programs for the holistic development of the poor and the marginal rural communities of Washim District. We work with the poor and vulnerable communities irrespective of cast, creed, religion and race with total number of households are 715 with 3719 population.

Therefore, our focus intervention is to enhance the livelihood of the rural community by promotion of sustainable agriculture practices and entitlement through community. We have trained farmers on sustainable agriculture practices and sensitized them on organic farming, low-cost drip irrigation, importance of mix cropping pattern, soil and water conservation structures, and availed various entitlements for sustaining annual livelihood of the marginal families. We have promoted practices of sustainable agriculture among the community through resilience farming that will increase annual food security of the people.

Farmers are motivated and guided to take up plot development for organic farming. They are taught to use local seeds, seeds germination, and seeds processing before the sowing. Farmers are encouraged to use Integrated pest management and Integrated nutrition management. Farmers are also motivated and encouraged to take up Mix cropping and food cropping. They are guided to develop Bio manure for the healthy product and to increase the productivity of the land. Marginal farmers are motivated to take up water management activities and soil and water conservation structures to increase the intensity of rain water harvesting in their fields. Farmers have acknowledged that soil and water conservation structures have helped to recharge the ground water level and increased the soil moisture and retain water for the crops for longer period. To enhance capacity of the farmers we have organized regular farmer's exposure program and exchanged visits to Various organizations.

Through the mercy and development work we have worked for the liberation and rights of the farmers, women and children and have reached out to poor needy, marginalized and vulnerable section of the society. We have formed Farmers club, Volunteers group, Village development committee, Coordination group, Mother and Child Committee, Mother collectives, Adolescents group and SHG's. Through the capacity building program, community mobilization, people are motivated and empowered and they have undertaken various issues of the village namely organic farming, safe drinking water, electricity, cleanliness, women's active participation in Gram Sabha. Women are motivated to live value-based life and to earn their livelihood though self-help group, nutritional garden, plantation of multiple fruits, saplings, animal husbandry, petty shops, etc. People are made aware of various income generating program and guidelines to tap government resources and resources available at their place. Small farmers are trained for Sustainable agricultural practices and encouraged for organic and mix farming in their area. We have focused on basic education for every child, prevention of malnutrition, health is wealth, grow green and love green, love organic.
